

- Nearly 1 million people in the city = 39 fire fighters = 2 fire engines (one is not in working condition = No uniform for fire fighters = marginalised fire fighters

Project Plan (FIREaid Kathmandu Project Plan)

After Tyne and Wear Chief Fire Officer Mr. Iain Bathgate's visit to Nepal :

Step 1:Complete administrative work in both ends (In Nepal and Tyne and Wear)

Step 2: Secure funding for transporting equipment to Nepal

Step 3: Equipment handling and management training at Kathmandu

Step 4: Community Safety and Awareness Training - including Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR), response and resilience planning.

Step 5 : Explore continuous support for Kathmandu Fire Brigade through networking, further fund raising and dissemination of project activities through news reports, conferences and academic writing.


Impacts of flood and landslides (January 2011)?












Slope stability: a new safety measures


